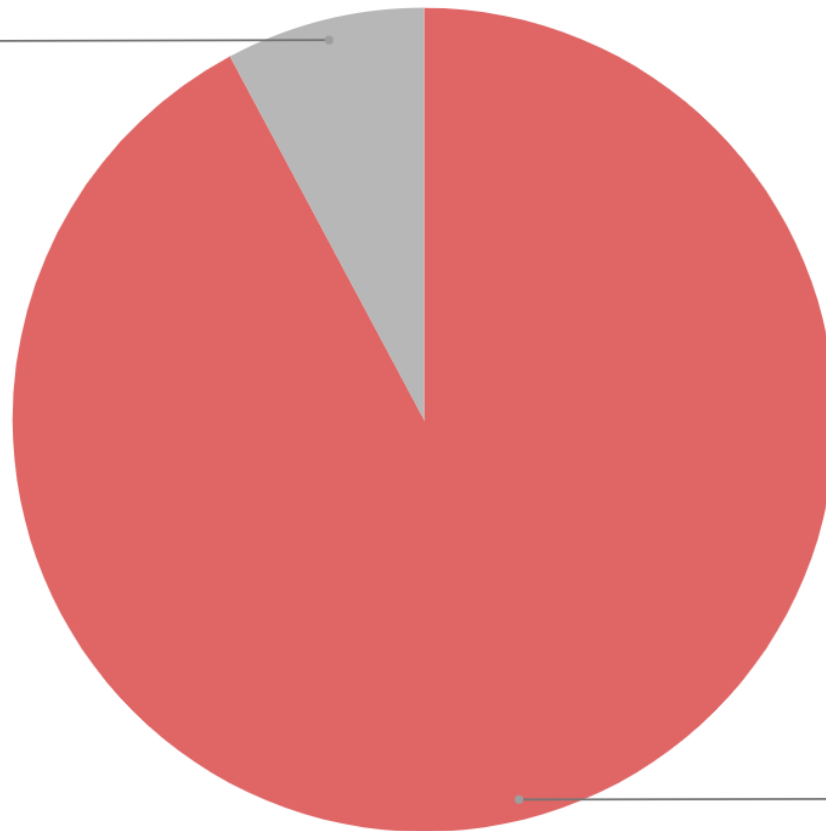

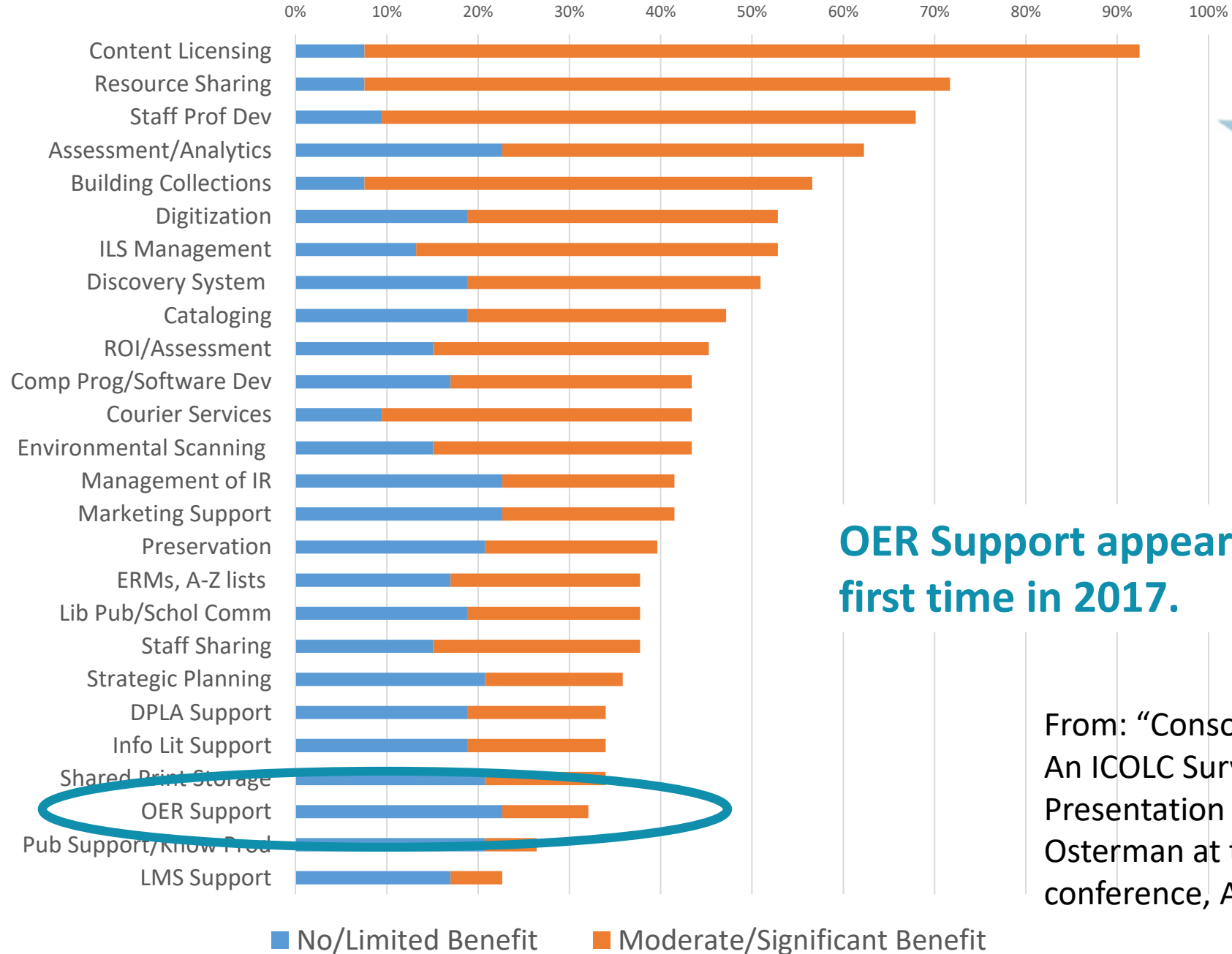

- “It is a subcommittee for our Strategic Plan in terms of affordability. One of our librarians is the head of this committee.”



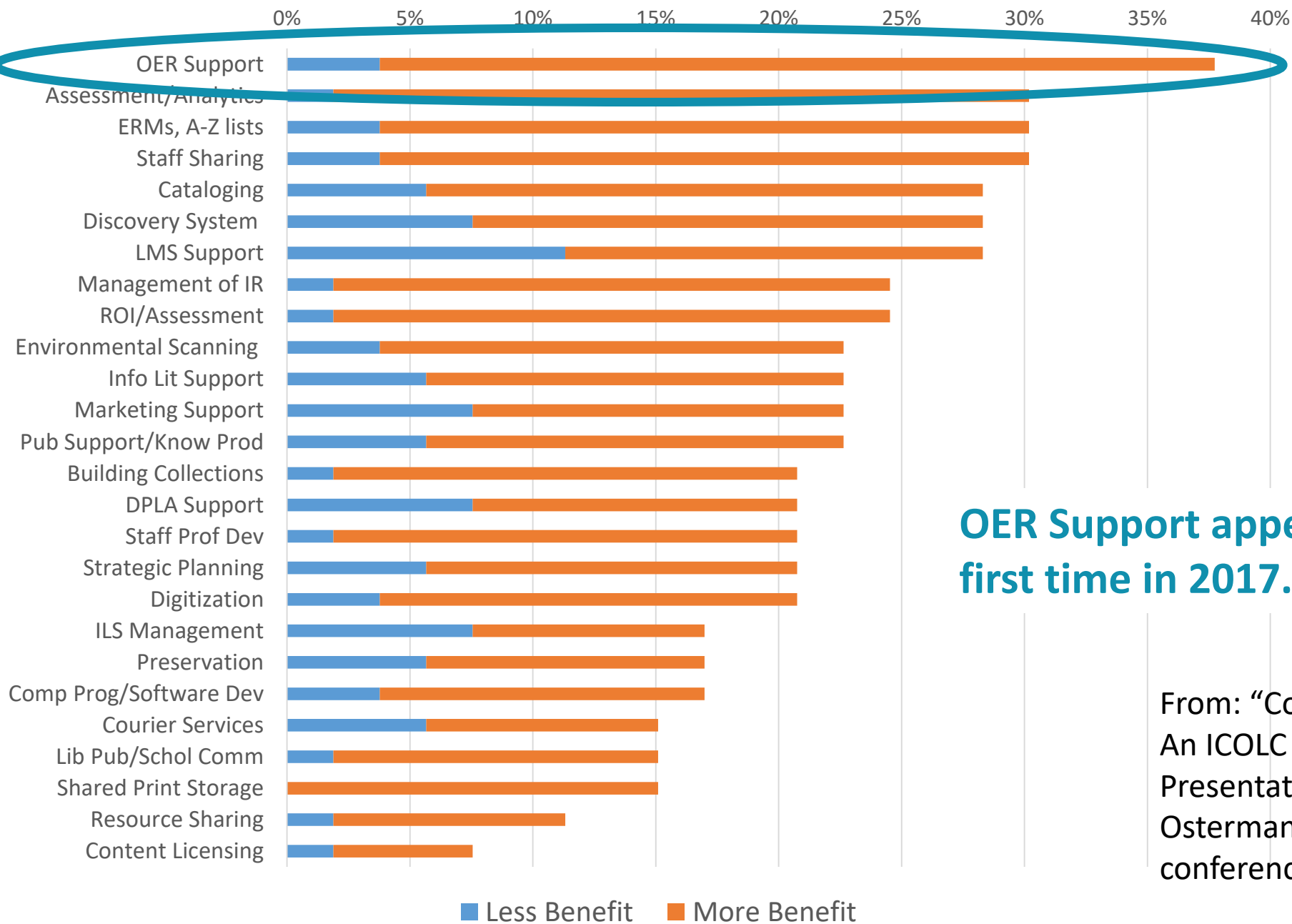
2017 Survey: Level of Benefit for Current Services

2017 Survey: Level of Benefit for Planned Services



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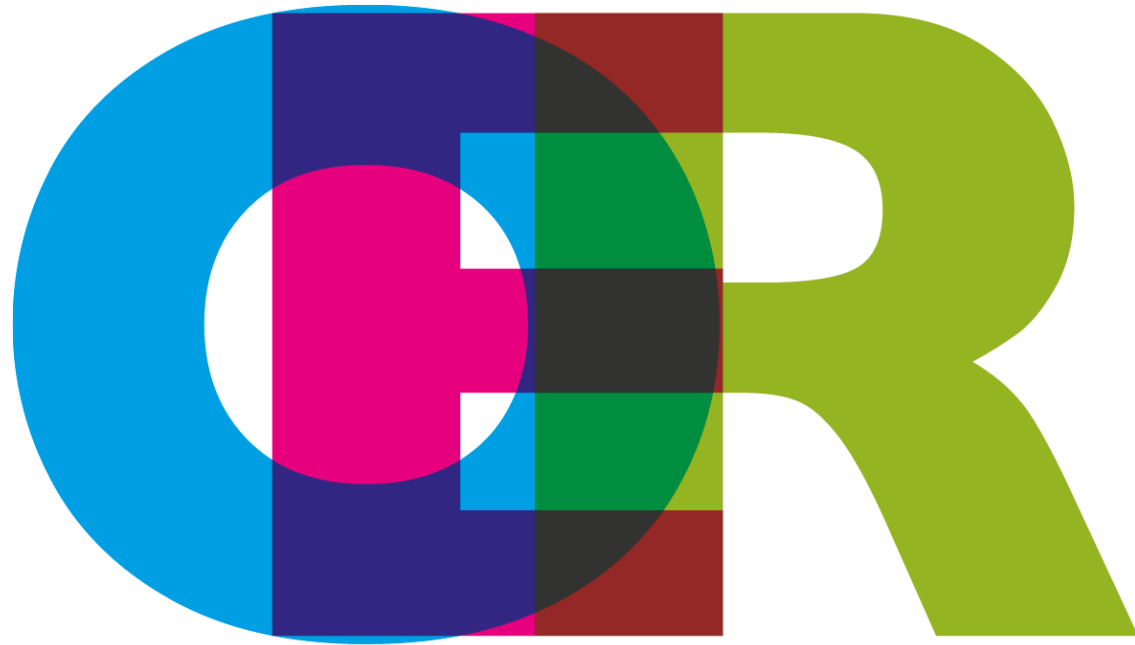

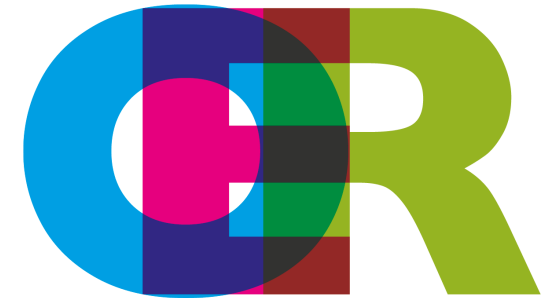

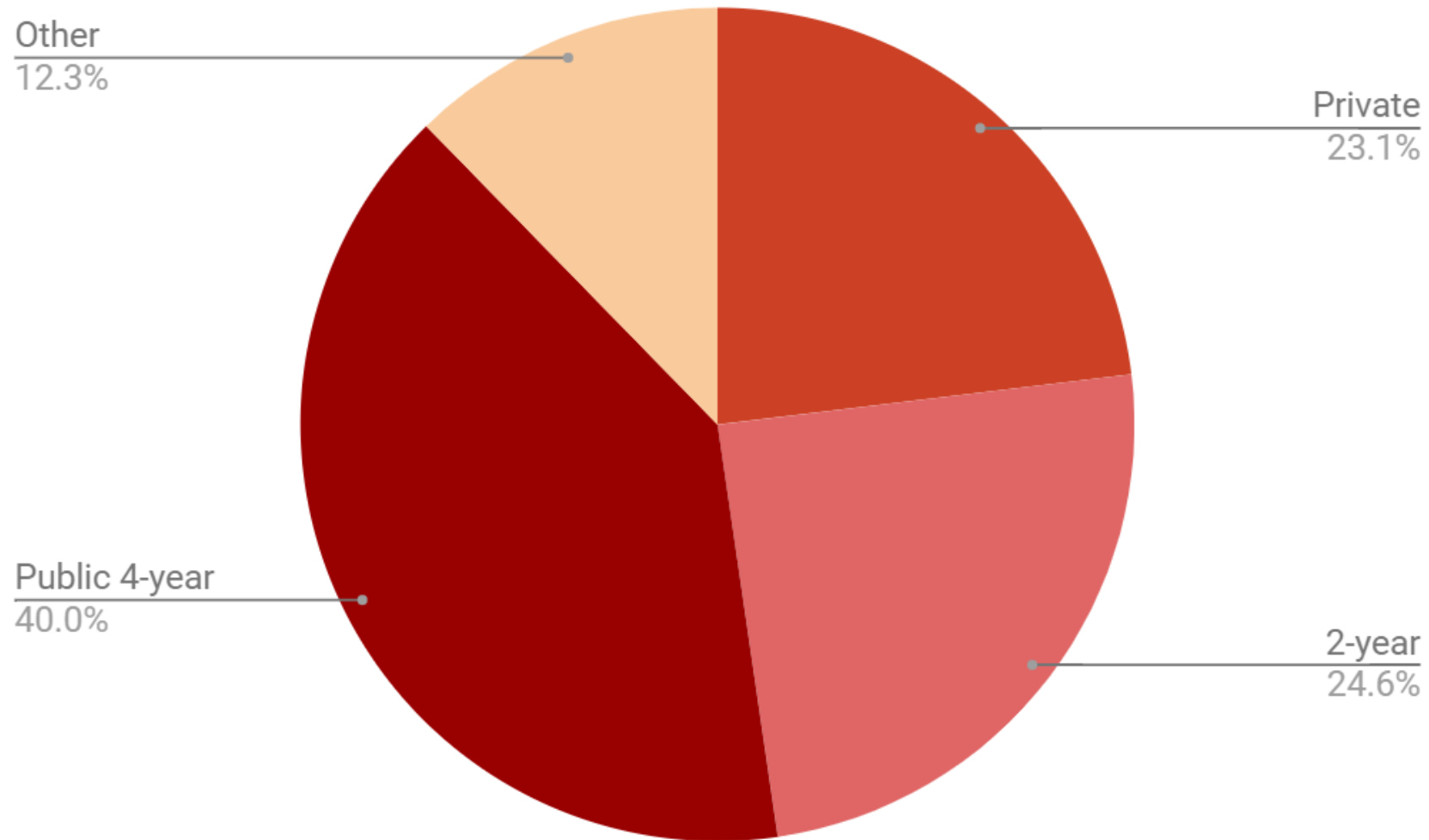

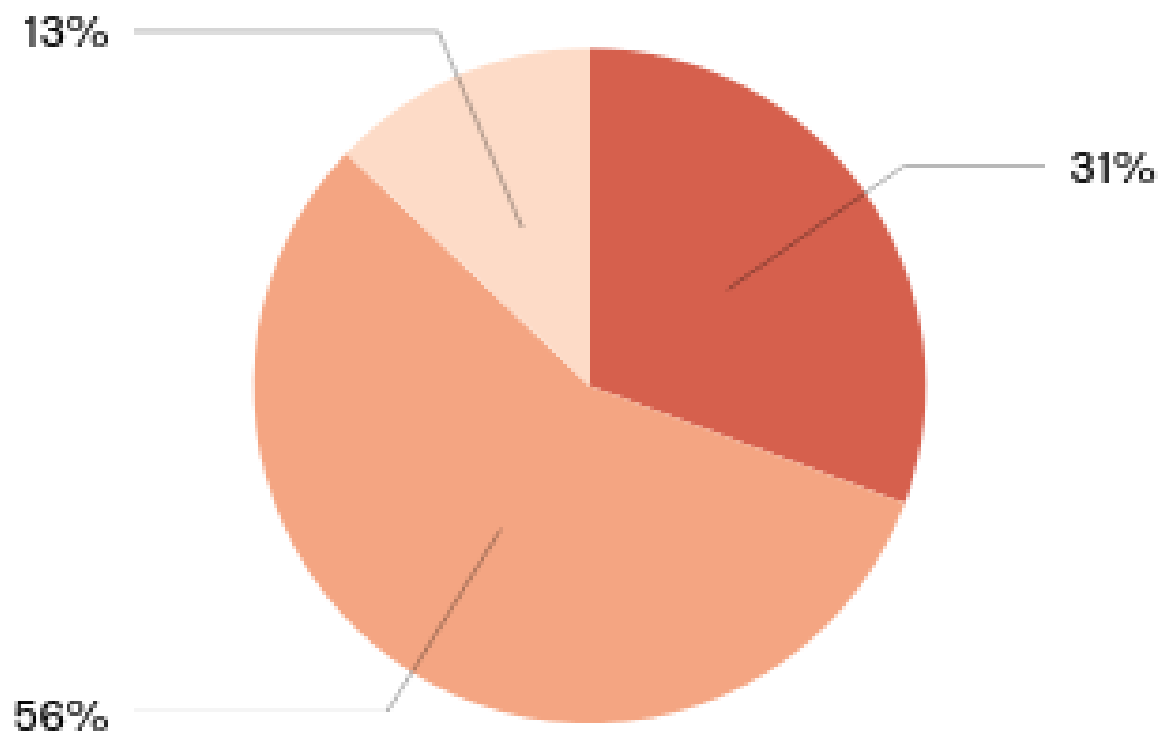

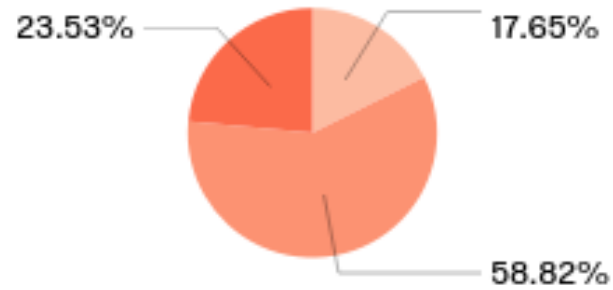

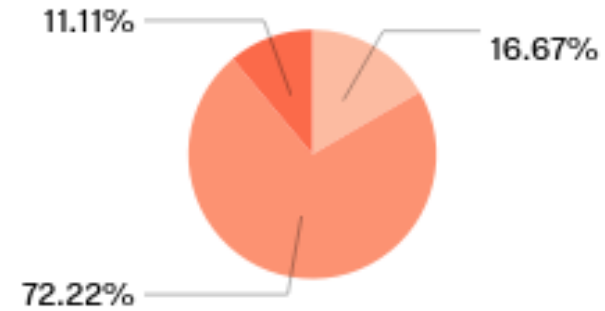

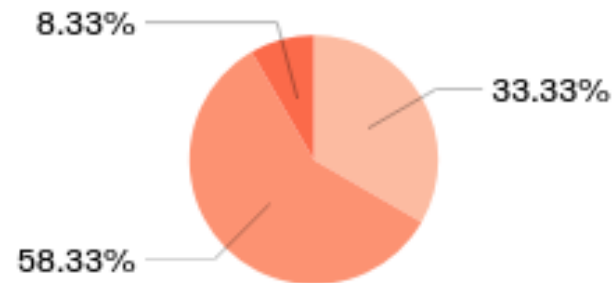

Doctoral/Research Universities

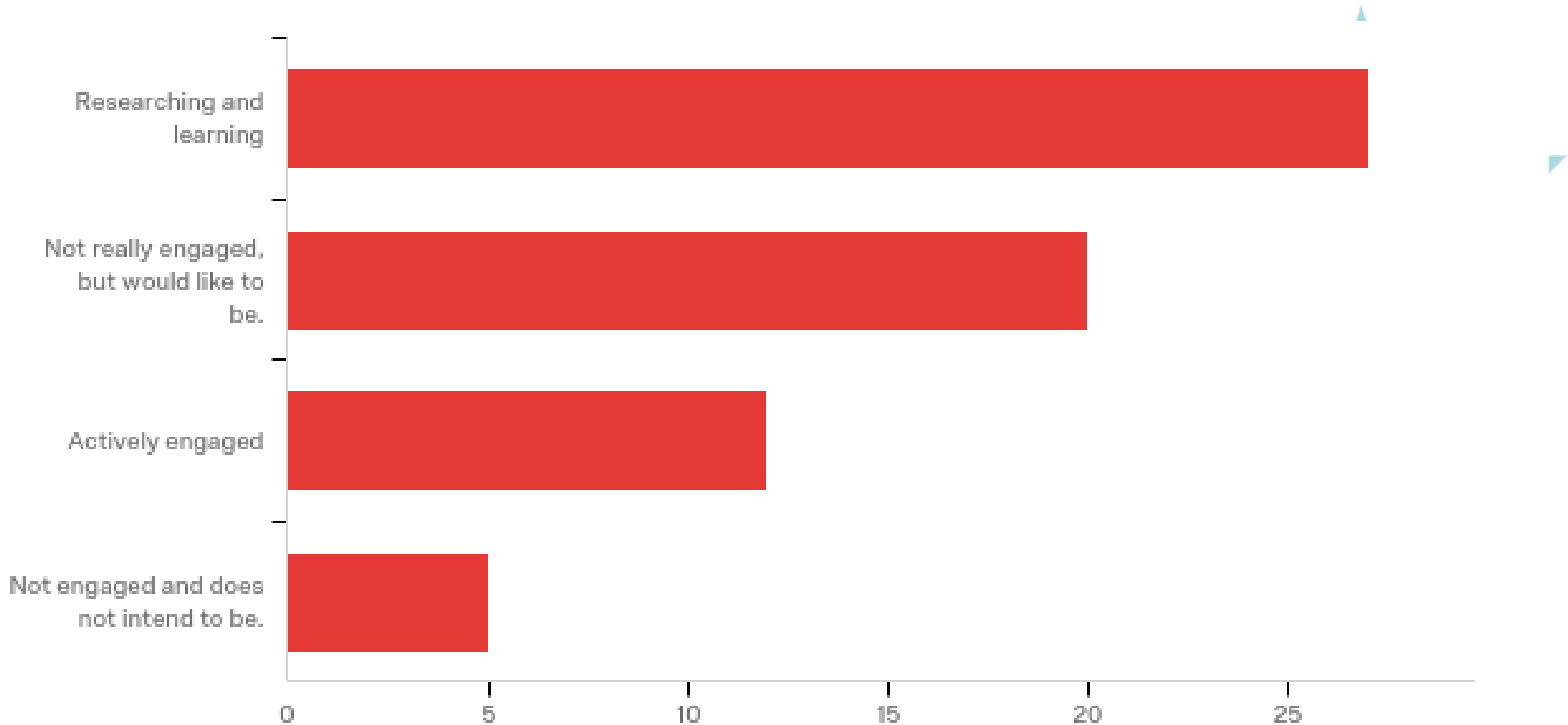


Master's Colleges and Universities

Level of library engagement with OER

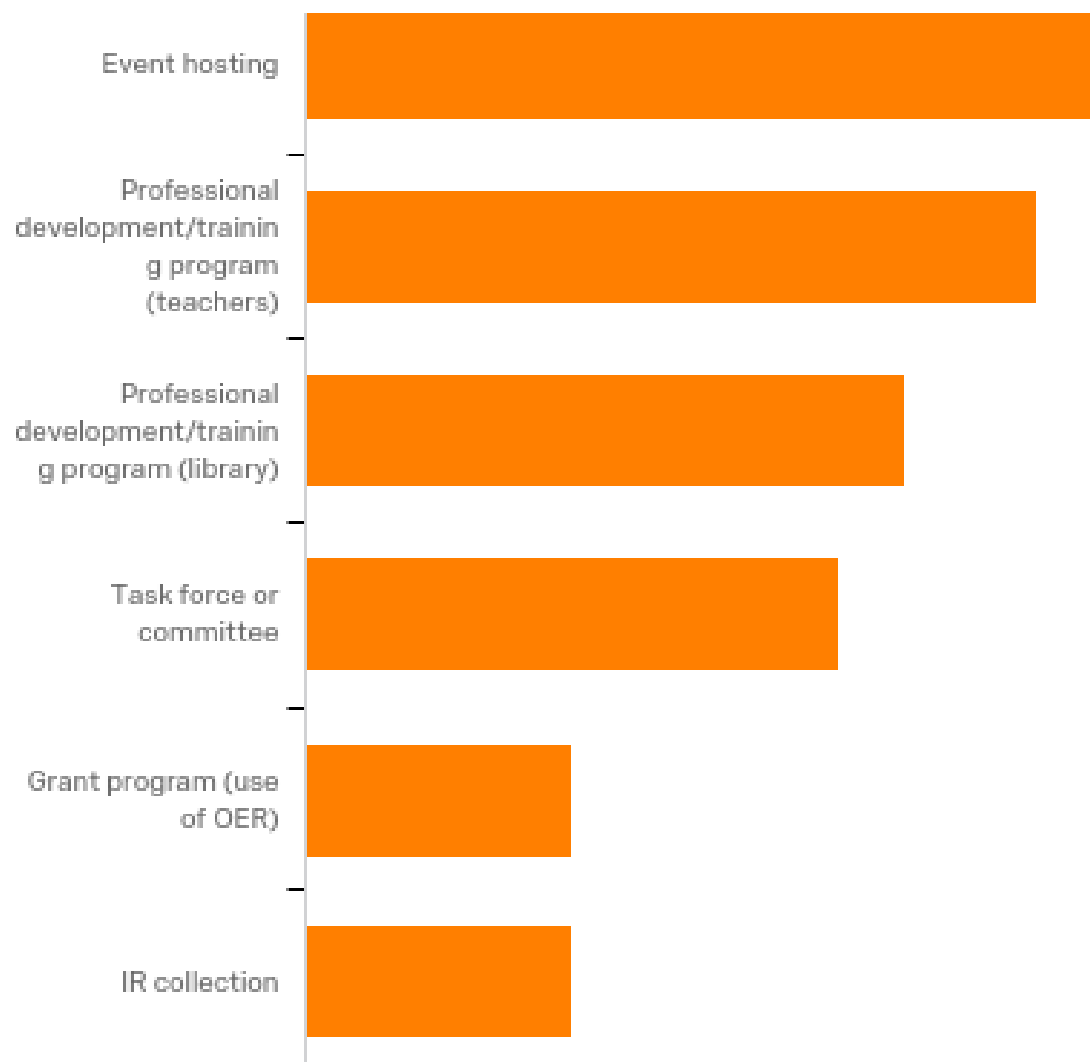
Library engagement with OER

- Associate's Colleges (29%) and Doctoral/Research universities (26%) were the most likely to be "actively engaged" with OER.
- Those who indicated no interest in OER, most likely to come from these same groups.



Types of OER Activity

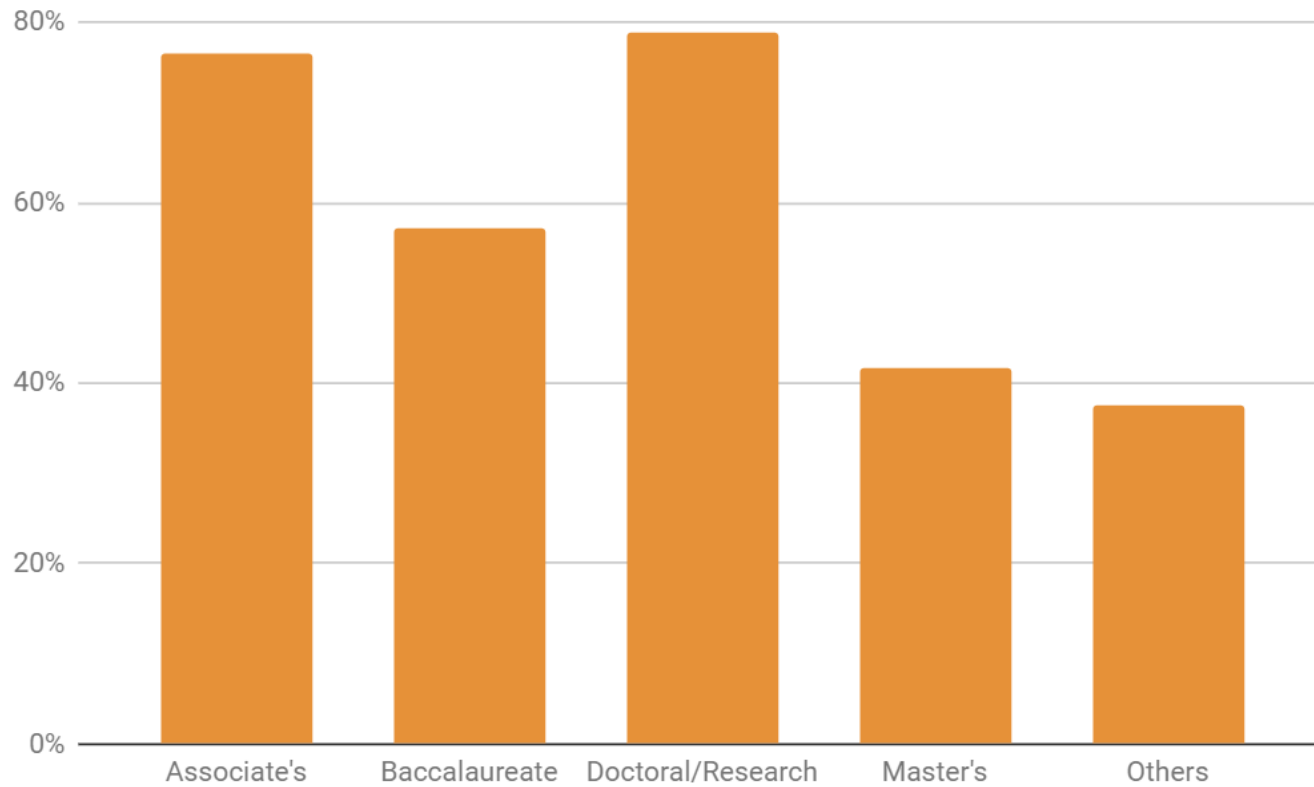
63% of respondents described some type of OER-related activity in their libraries

- Activities related to 0-cost degree grants





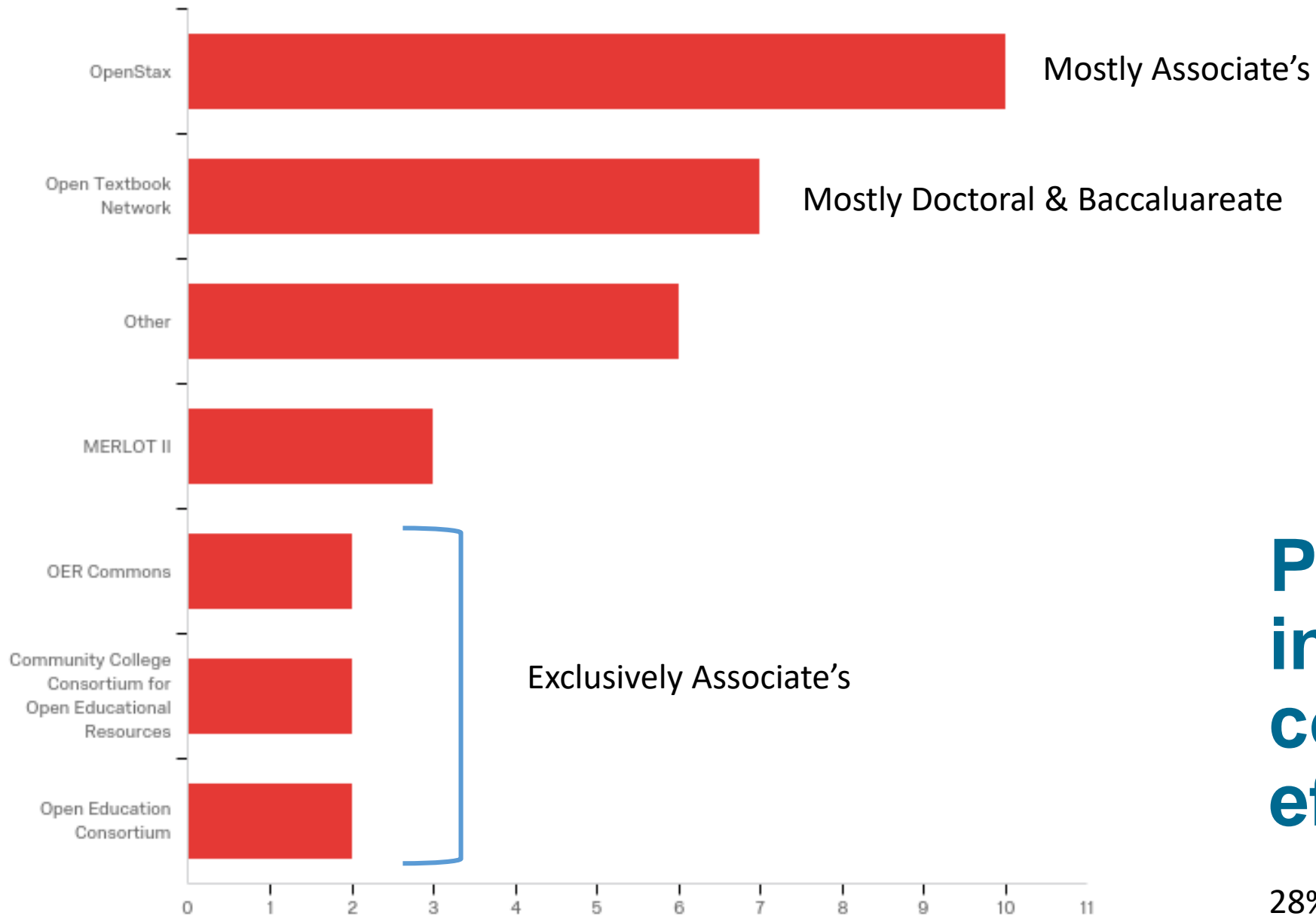
Percentage giving at least one response

Comments on activities

- “We have several research projects underway to investigate the impact of OER and open pedagogy: one on OER use and student understanding of copyright & licensing, one on open pedagogy and student understanding of copyright & licensing, and one on student engagement with OER in alternative formats.”
- Several references to OTN (and other) workshops, as well as presentations and outreach to faculty

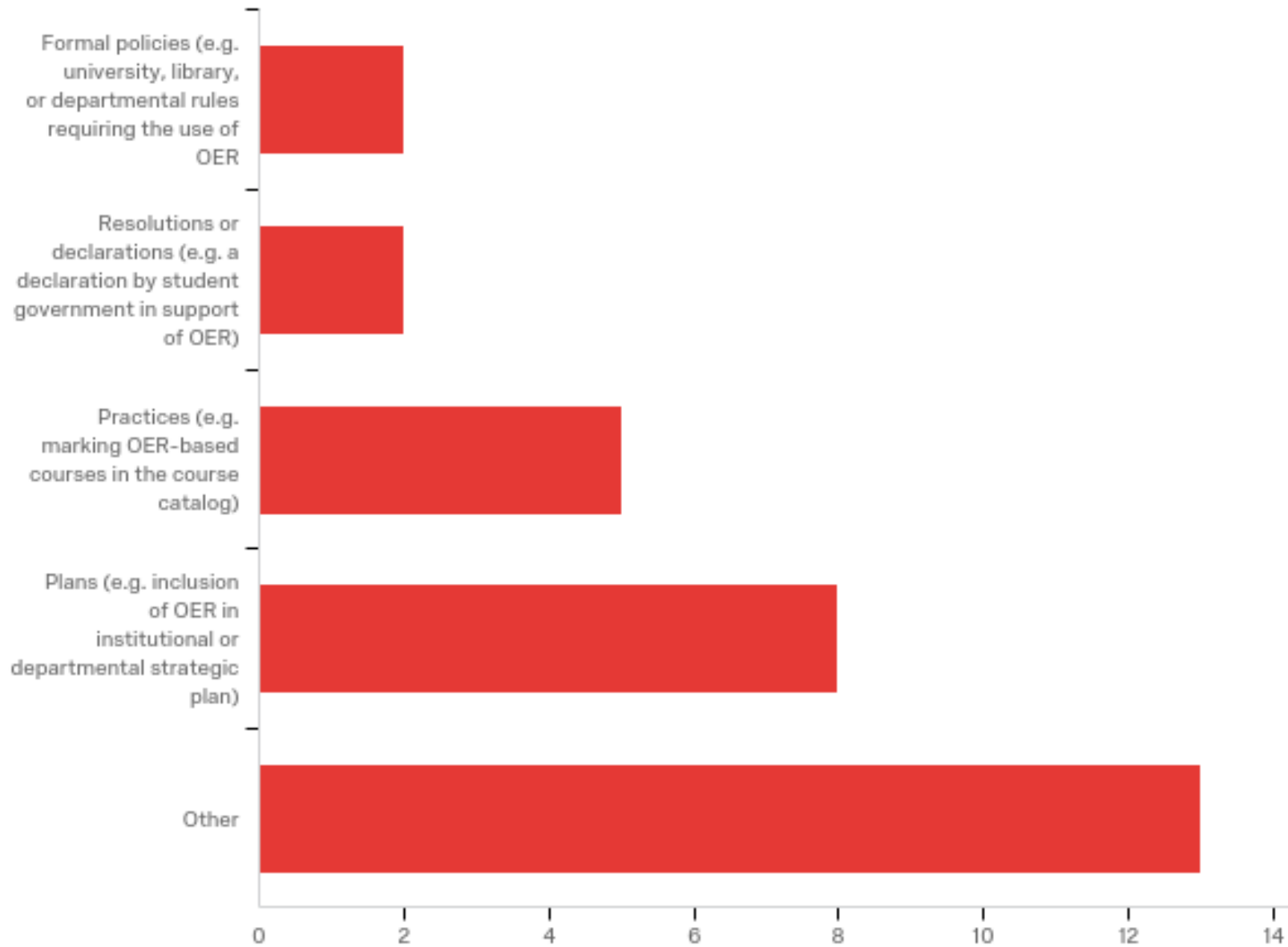


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Participation in collaborative efforts

collaborative organization



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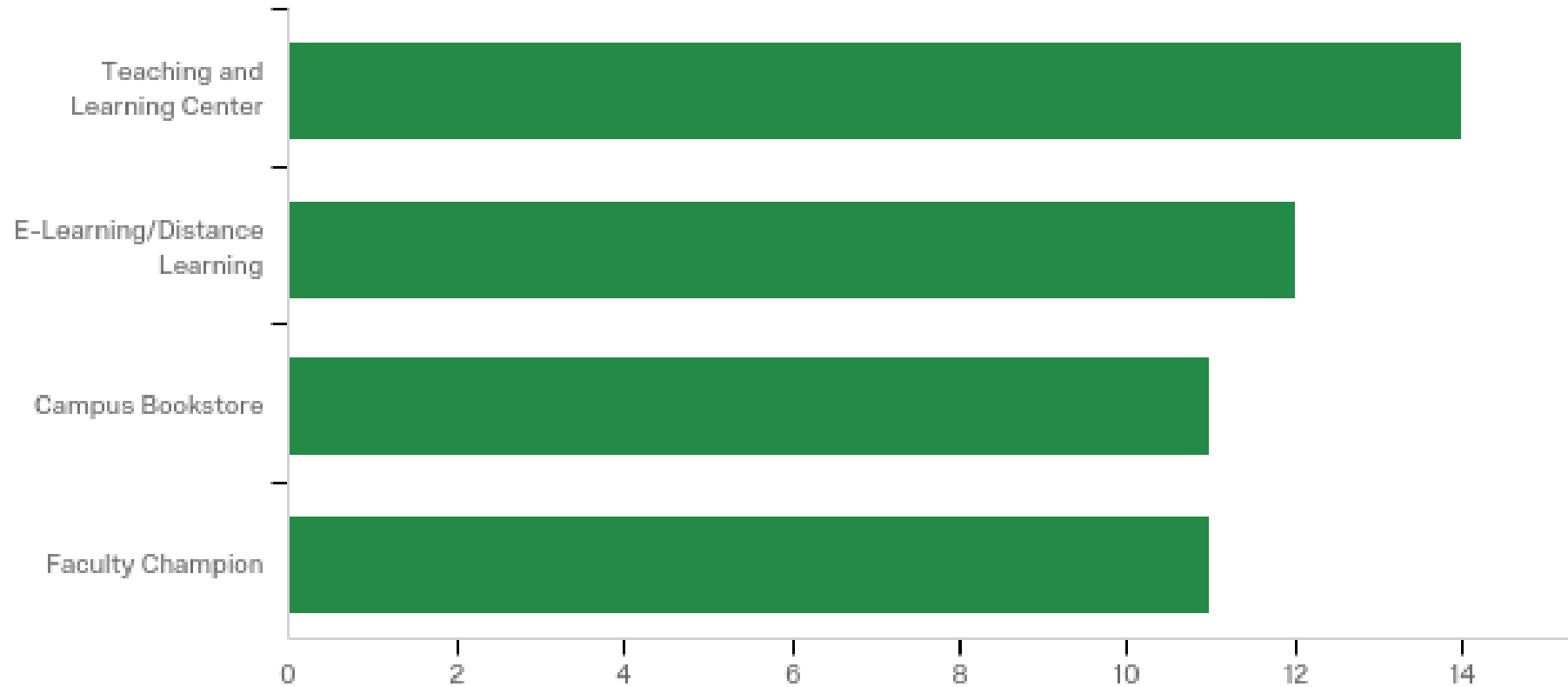

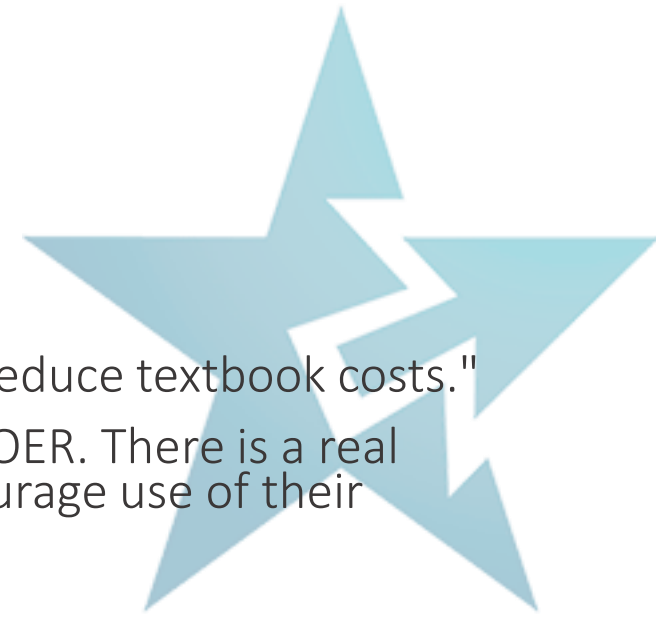
Policies, practices, and resolutions

- Policies and procedures related to grant-funded development of low-cost degrees

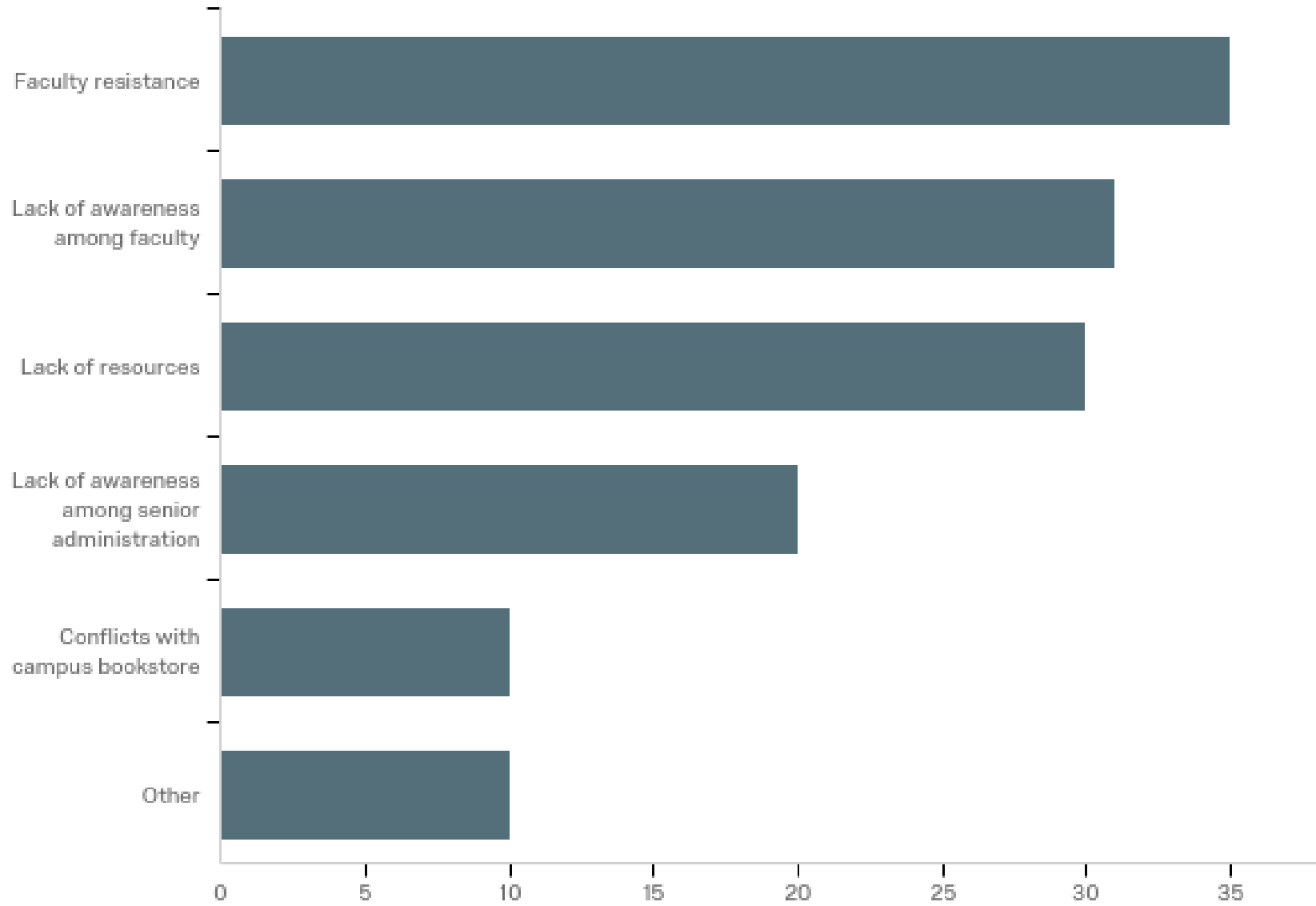

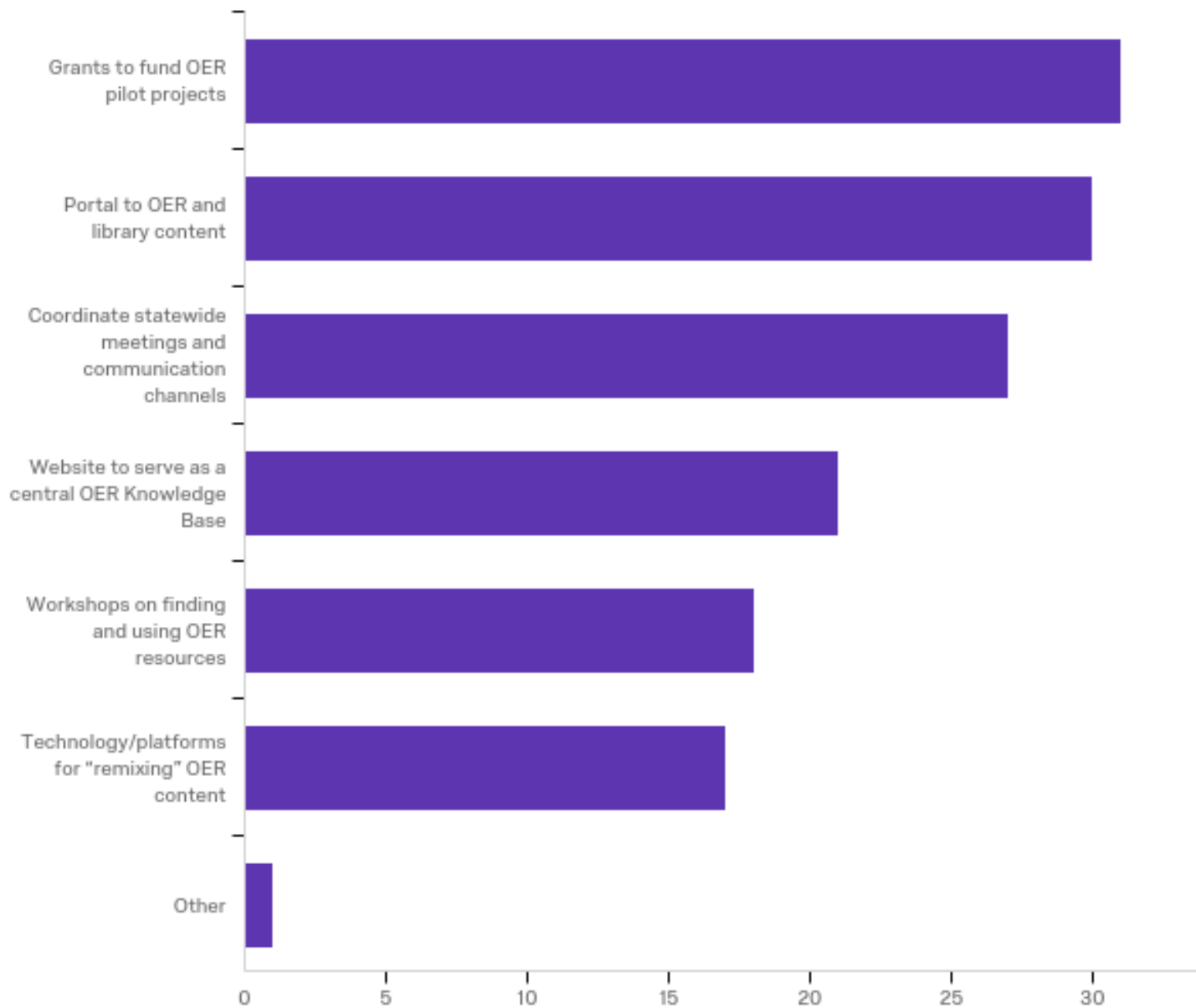
- "We're just becoming aware of OERs and the potential they may provide to reduce textbook costs."
- "There have been faculty, administration, student and library champions for OER. There is a real commitment to using OER. We are doing more work with Open Stax to encourage use of their textbooks."
- "There are several departments that are using open textbooks."
- "Student government has a campaign to promote faculty adoption of OER."
- "Academic IT supports faculty with the integration of Lumen Learning OER course material into Blackboard via the LTI. Senior Administration are actively involved in the AtD OER Degree grant and working with other college partners to promote and inform on the use of OER. Librarians & Instructional Designers as part of the Teaching & Learning Excellence Division support and train faculty on OER and OpenPed. Faculty in several departments who have successfully adopted OER for their courses serve as informal champions to encourage discussion and further adoption at their department level. Student government president ran on a platform supporting OER and OpenStax adoption. They are aware of OER, but have some misconceptions about it (as do other students) and could benefit from a student focused awareness campaign. "

Final comments



- "It's a huge undertaking if done right, and we're already down a full-time position in our library. I don't see us having the staff to take on such a project any time in the near future."
- "I hope that OERs join the mix of subscription databases, online resources, and even traditional textbooks in meeting the needs of students at higher education institutions in Texas. Anything the Coordinating Board and Texas Digital Library could do to facilitate the evaluation and vetting of such resources (including indicating which institutions in Texas may be using them) would be very, very helpful to those of us in smaller private institutions. Of course, grants to create them would be good too, but the former mean more to the smaller private universities for now."

Conclusions and considerations



- There's a wide range of engagement and interest in OERs. Most everyone is interested – but not every institution.
- Most libraries are doing planning, investigating, or training. There are a few institutions "out in front", leading the way on OERs. They tend to be either community colleges or larger doctoral institutions.
- There may be (relatively) low-hanging fruit that can provide value to the Texas community (i.e. a statewide OER summit).
- Larger, more complex initiatives require resources – either community-sourced or legislative.
