The Museum Studies Program

- 2-year graduate degree program
- 10-person cohorts
- "Boutique" program
- Theory, practical experience, hands-on training
- Aimed at preparing students for jobs in field



Department of Museum Studies



The Department of Museum Studies offers a Masters of Arts degree in museum studies, which combines academic and professional training for students preparing to be the next generation of museum leaders. Students pursuing graduate and undergraduate degrees in other disciplines at Baylor may also take a minor in museum studies. The master's program consists of 36 semester bours. If a student wishes to pursue a minor in Museum Studies, they would complete 9 semester hours. On the undergraduate minor 18 semester hours are required.

Students learn about the history and philosophy of different types of museums, about the different skills that are needed in museum administration, museum education, collections management and care, archival management, and exhibit design, as well as courses on material culture, decorative arts, historic preservation, and museum ethics. 
